### ANDREW TIX, PSYCHOLOGY, NORMANDEALE COMMUNITY COLLEGE, BLOOMINGTON, MN

#### PSYC 1110/General Psychology/4 cr. (NCC), 3 cr. (UW Campuses)

This course is an introduction to the scientific study of human behavior and mental processes. It prepares students for pursuing a major in psychology. The course introduces the problems, methods and findings of modern psychology to beginning students. Topics include research methods, statistics, neuroscience, sensation and perception, learning, memory, intelligence, development, personality, abnormal behavior, treatment and social psychology.

Relevant research on these topics will be emphasized.
